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

DISCOVERING THE LEGENDS OF GOLF

Laguna National Golf and Country Club in Singapore has been named as the new venue for The Championship from May 1-4, 2014.

It marks a return to the island country for The European Tour and the Asian Tour, which co-sanctioned the Singapore Masters there in the six years between 2002 and 2007 and the Singapore Open from 2009 to 2012. It also marks a return of top level professional golf to the Masters Course at Laguna National, an Andy Dye design which has regularly been ranked among the top courses in the world by Golf Digest International and Asian Golf

Monthly, and one which has garnered a host of awards through the years.

The Championship at Laguna National formerly the Ballantine's Championship - was originally scheduled to be played in Korea next month but when staging issues made it clear that was not going to be possible, tournament organisers acted quickly and decisively to move the tournament to Singapore.

As originally planned, a field of 156 players will battle it out for the lion's share of a US\$1.5 million prize fund, while television pictures of

the spectacular Laguna National Golf and Country Club will be beamed to a potential television audience of over 450 million homes in 60 countries. The field will consist of players from Europe, Asia, Korea and Singapore.


Keith Waters, Chief Operating Officer and Director of International Policy for The European Tour, said: "We are delighted to announce that The Championship will be played at the Laguna National Golf and Country Club in Singapore, a venue we have enjoyed a wonderful relationship with in the past and one that I know our members will enjoy returning to next month."

"It shows the strength of our relationship with Laguna National that they have been able to help us out at relatively short notice and we would therefore like to put on record our thanks to owner Peter Kwee and all his staff for their assistance."

With the Championship aiming to return to Korea in 2015, the event continues to feature both Korean players and to be extensively broadcast in Korea."

This year's champion will join an eclectic mix of former winners of the event which includes former US Open champion Graeme McDowell, Thongchai Jaidee and Marcus Fraser, who all won at Pinx Golf Club on Jeju Island; and former European Tour Number One Lee Westwood, Bernd Wiesberger and Brett Rumford who all triumphed at Blackstone Golf Club near Seoul.

Former winners of the Singapore Masters at Laguna National Golf and Country Club include eight time European Tour Number One Colin Montgomerie, Nick Dougherty, Arjun Atwal, the Chinese duo of Zhang Lian-wei and Liang Wen-chong and Singapore's own Mardan Mamat.



SWEDE STENSON CROWNED KING

When Henrik Stenson eagled the final hole at the DP World Tour Championship, Dubai, it provided a fitting end to a spectacular 2013 season for the Swede.

Not only did Stenson's stunning three wood approach to two feet – later named The European Tour's Shot of the Year – not only sealed the tournament title, but also The Race to Dubai crown, as he completed a unique double having also won the Fed Ex Cup on the US PGA Tour.

Stenson produced an unrelenting second half to the 2013 campaign, which included finishing joint runner up in The Open Championship and tied third in the US PGA Championship, as he won the European Tour Golfer of the Month award in August, September and November, before naturally being named Race to Dubai Golfer of the Year.

He became only the second Swede after Robert Karlsson in 2008 to win the Harry Vardon Trophy, and virtually assured himself a place in Paul McGinley's Ryder Cup Team for Gleneagles, having last appeared in the biennial contest in 2008.

Aside from Stenson's remarkable achievements, it was also a season to remember for Englishman Justin Rose, a former European Tour Number One, who made his Major breakthrough with victory in the US Open Championship at Merion Golf Club, following his close friend Adam Scott's victory in the Masters Tournament.

In becoming the first Englishman since Tony Jacklin in 1970 to win the US Open, Rose held off the challenge of Phil Mickelson to triumph in Pennsylvania, but the American did not have to wait too long to extend his impressive CV, lifting the Claret Jug for the first time with victory at Muirfield having honed his links game with victory in the Aberdeen Asset Management Scottish Open the week before.

The season's final Major, the US PGA Championship, was won by Mickelson's compatriot Jason Dufner, while Tiger Woods claimed both the WGC - Cadillac Championship and WGC - Bridgestone Invitational.

The two other WGC titles were also won by Americans, with Matt Kuchar defeating Hunter Mahan to win the WGC - Accenture Match Play and Dustin Johnson landing the WGC - HSBC Champions.

It was also a prosperous campaign for the French contingent on the European Tour, with the country supplying a record-equalling four champions in a single season on The European Tour International Schedule.

Grégory Bourdy, who wrote his own slice of history when he became the first player in the history of the Seve Trophy to win five points out of five as Continental Europe triumphed, won the ISPS Handa Wales Open to add his name to a roll call of French champions in 2013, following the earlier victories by Raphaël Jacquelin (Open de España) and Julien Quesne (70° OPEN D'ITALIA LINDT).

Emerging star Victor Dubuisson then joined that group with an impressive performance in the Turkish Airlines Open by the Ministry of Culture and Tourism, posting the 30th French victory on The European Tour in the third leg of the inaugural Final Series on The Race to Dubai.

However, there was no home winner of the Alstom Open de France as Northern Ireland's Graeme McDowell took the title. The former US Open Champion had earlier prevailed in the Volvo World Match Play Championship, and was one of five two-time winners on The European Tour in 2013, alongside Woods, Mickelson, Australian Brett Rumford, who claimed back-to-back titles at the Ballantine's Championship and Volvo China Open, and Dutchman Joost Luiten, who followed his earlier win in the Lyoness Open powered by Greenfinity with a "home" triumph in the KLM Open.



A week prior to that, Denmark's Thomas Björn won the Omega European Masters and the European Tour's Tournament Committee Chairman will be the defending champion in 2014 when tournament will be played for the 80th time.


Miguel Angel Jiménez, who made his 25th successive appearance in the event which he won in 2010 set a new record as the oldest European Tour winner at the age of 48 years and 318 days when he won the 2012 UBS Hong Kong Open.

The 2013 BMW International Open celebrated its 25th birthday and Ernie Els provided the icing on the cake by claiming the title, while the BMW Masters presented by SRE Group, won by Spain's Gonzalo Fernandez-Castaño, brought the curtain up on the inaugural Final Series in which Dustin Johnson (WGC - HSBC Champions), Dubuisson and Stenson (DP World Tour Championship, Dubai) were also victors.

The fifth edition of The Race to Dubai had begun in South Africa with Glasgow's Scott Jamieson, a graduate of the 2010 Challenge Tour, claiming his maiden win in the Nelson Mandela Championship presented by ISPS Handa at Royal Durban. In all, The European Tour visited 28 destinations, among those being Morocco where Germany's Marcel Siem won the Trophee Hassan II and Russia where the M2M Russian Open enabled Michael Hoey to give Northern Ireland their 49th European Tour win.

Jamieson was one of 12 first time winners on The European Tour in 2013 –England's Chris Wood (Commercial Bank Qatar Masters), Kuchar (WGC - Accenture Match Play Championship), South Africa's Dawie Van der Walt (Tshwane Open), Thailand's Kiradech Aphibarnrat (Maybank Malaysian Open), American Peter Uihlein (Madeira Islands Open - Portugal - BPI), Ireland's Simon Thornton (Najeti Hotels et Golfs Open presented by Neufize OBC), Dufner (US PGA Championship), England's Tommy Fleetwood (Johnnie Walker Championship at Gleneagles), Korea's Jin Jeong (ISPS HANDA Perth International), Johnson and Dubuisson also all recorded maiden victories. Uihlein, who finished 14th on The Race to Dubai, was named Sir Henry Cotton Rookie of the Year.

The global influence of The European Tour is well recognised. With Bulgaria and Turkey staging



tournaments in 2013, no fewer than 41 countries – 69 when the Challenge and Senior Tours are included – have now hosted European Tour events and in all no fewer than 420 different players from 35 countries have been crowned European Tour champions. Rolex has been encouraging the development, organisation and promotion of golf worldwide throughout the Tour's lifetime, in addition to being the proud partner and Official Timekeeper of The European Tour since 1997, and on November 13, 2013, their long-standing partnership was further enhanced by a decade-long extension running until 2022 and including Rolex's partnership with The Ryder Cup.

George O'Grady, Chief Executive of The European Tour, said: "Rolex's commitment to the game of golf is unparalleled. THE MASTERS COURSE ROARS BACK TO LIFE

It has witnessed scenes of triumph and jubilation, winning putt of victors and the despair of those who finish second best.

The voracious roars from the galleries, the play-off euphoria and the generosity of a champion.

The Masters Course at Laguna National Golf and Country Club is a place where history has been made, records broken and golfing memories etched in the minds of many.

The Championship at Laguna National will be played at the Masters course again and another spell binding chapter in golf is waiting to be written from the Lion City.

Zhang Lian-wei, long regarded as the China's flag bearer for golf, put the world's most populous nation on the golfing map when he sank a gutsy birdie on the 72nd hole at the Masters Course for a one-shot win over Major winner Ernie Els of South Africa in the Singapore Masters in 2003.

The win made Zhang the first Chinese and only the fifth Asian to win a European Tour sanctioned event back then.

The Masters Course at Laguna National Golf and Country Club has always been a happy hunting ground for many of the Asian Tour's stars.



Fast forward three years later to 2006, Singapore's very own Mardan Mamat also inked his place in the record books when he completed a wire-to-wire victory by holding off defending champion Nick Dougherty of England for an emotional home win.

Liang Wen-chong followed up compatriot Zhang's heroics when he savoured his maiden Asian Tour victory by pipping Malaysia's Iain Steel to the Singapore Masters title in a play-off.

Like a true champion with a heart of gold, Liang donated all his winnings of over US\$183,000 towards the development of golf in China after his famous victory in 2007.

Come May 1-4, the crowds will return, the cheers will be heard all over again.

And with that, another slice of history at the Masters Course waiting to be written.

1st Hole

Second Chance - Par4 | 382yds

A short par-four dog-leg left. The drive should be positioned on the right of the fairway to open up an easy approach to a green wide open front and right. The key is the second shot and judging the distance of the wedge.

2nd Hole

Double Trouble - Par5 | 564yds

An 'S-shaped' par-five that has water on both sides and is rated stroke index one for amateurs. The first landing area has a lake to the right. The second landing zone has a lake on the left, causing the hole to turn right and then left towards the green. The green is large with water to the left and bunkers to the right.

3rd Hole

Go For It - Par4 | 338yds

The shortest par-four on the course, but it may, perhaps, also be the most fun. The fairways swings wide to the right. As long as your ball stays dry from the tee, a relatively easy second shot will follow, allowing the prospect of picking up a birdie.

4th Hole

Smooth Sailing - Par4 | 390yds

The hole plays downhill before gently winding to the right around a lake to a generous landing area. The green is large with the option of numerous pin positions making the approach shot vary from simple to difficult.

5th Hole

Long Beach - Par3 | 192yds

The first of the par-three plays to a large green that tilts towards the tee. The tee and the green are both elevated with sand running down the entire left side.

6th Hole

Double Curl - Par4 | 434yds

A large sand bunker and mound on the right encourage the player to aim left to a wide landing area. From there, the approach must be precise because another long bunker guards the left of the elongated green with more bunkers to the right.

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7th Hole

Runway - Par5 | 612yds

The longest hole on the Masters Course, this par-five is notable for small grass depressions left and right. The final 110 yards presents a narrow chute to a green that requires a delicate touch for chipping and putting.

8th Hole

Peninsula - Par3 | 180yds

This hole is a test of character, accuracy and ability. With water front and back and sand to the right, has a small fairway for a bail out and is separated by a large roll from back to front in the centre. The left side has water front and back and narrows to a bunker.

9th Hole

Home Stretch - Par4 | 449yds

An accurate tee-shot to the right will position the ball close to the bunker that runs the length of the hole. With sand and water surrounding the left, back and right of the green, an approach shot that lands short and runs to the pin from left to right is required.

10th Hole

Sandy Start - Par4 | 435yds

A medium par 4 that plays with varying degrees of difficulty from different tees angled on the edge of the dogleg left. Aim at the left edge of the target bunker on the right, just pass the landing area. The green is guarded by bunkers on the left. Smart players go for the centre or front of the green. A par here is a good start.

11th Hole

Fair Enough - Par5 | 545yds

The tee shot should be kept as far to the left to set up the second shot. At the landing area, the fairways drop rapidly to the green. This could add 10 to 20 metres to your normal tee shot from the white tee box 456m to the green. It is possible to birdie on this par5 or lucky to avoid a bogey.

12th Hole

Easy Does It - Par3 | 185yds

There are eight pin placements on this green, each one making the hole different in strategy and difficulty. As such, club selection is crucial. Two types of recovery shots exist for those who overshoot the green - either a wedge from a deep grass bunker or a bump-and-run from behind the putting surface.

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13th Hole

The Throat - Par4 | 367yds

The shortest par4 on the back nine is a hole that demands accuracy and strategy. The lake line and bunker line give the player a near vision of where to aim. The professionals may well opt for an iron off the tee, but they will still expect to set themselves up for a realistic birdie putt.

14th Hole

Up & Down - Par4 | 448yds

A long and deceiving par4 that plays uphill off the tee and then downhill to the green. The hole winds right to left from the tee and left to right from the landing area to the green. A kidney-shaped green flows from left to right with a pot bunker in the centre.

15th Hole

Birdie Challenge - Par5 | 560yds

Another hole that calls for a well thought out strategy, most notably with where you attempt to place your second shot. Many will choose to lay-up right and short of the long, slim fairway bunker, leaving a wedge approach to the green. Those who stray to the left with their second shot may find a watery grave.

16th Hole

Eagles Nest - Par4 | 405yds

A slight dog-left to an elevated green, it is essential that the tee shot is to the right of the large bunker. If the approach is too far left, a blind sand shot may be required to find the green.

17th Hole

Cold Feet - Par3 | 201yds

Arguably the most difficult and exciting par3 on the course, the player needs an accurate long-distance carry over water to the long and narrow green, although the most delicate of chips is required from there to ensure the ball does not roll into the water.

18th Hole

The Gallery - Par4 | 384yds

Target golf is the order of the day, a demanding short par4 to close. There are many pin placements available, near and away from the water, front and back. The scene of Mardan Mamat's memorable up-and-down for a winning par last year, the final hole will have its fair share of thrills and spills in 2014.
